### News from ACRATH Western Australia

ACRATH WA have been extremely busy over the last few months raising awareness about Human Trafficking by partnering with Catholic Mission WA, Red Cross, Anti -Slavery Australia and the Freedom Partnership. We had the great honour of welcoming Marietta Latonio to Perth to speak about her inspiring work in helping women and children trafficked in Cebu, Philippines.

Professor Latonio worked with Australian Sister Angela Reed RSM, to produce the book, *I Have a Voice*, which recounts the experiences of 40 women survivors from Cebu Province. 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## Forced Marriage Awareness Raising and Education report

It is very exciting that the My Rights – My Future forced marriage Kit for Australian Secondary Schools is now one of the many resources available for download at mybluesky.org.au.

The purpose of the Kit is to raise awareness, and educate young people, about forced marriage as it is practised in Australia. Please feel welcome to visit the mybluesky.org.au website, where you can access the Kit via the Learn More navigation tool. We are very grateful to the Anti-Slavery Australia Team for uploading the Kit for use by the Australian education community.

Our work on training front-line educators and community workers continues. Over the coming weeks we will be training teachers in Adelaide on the use of the Kit. We will also be providing a presentation on forced marriage for Third Year Social Work Students at Victoria University, and presenting a learning session about forced marriage for Year 11 & 12 students from Mercy secondary schools across Australia.

We are delighted to be able to announce that this year we are one of the recipients of the John Wallis Foundation Small Grants Program. We are very grateful to the Foundation for assisting us to continue our forced marriage work.

Our forced marriage Project for this grant is being utilised for the professional development of educators in regional and rural areas, in order that even more students will benefit from the learning materials contained in the My Rights – My Future forced marriage Kit. This Project reflects the spirit of the work of the Missionary Sisters of Service, and its key aim is to protect and support young people in, or at risk of, forced marriage.

It is extremely important to continue to raise awareness about forced marriage in order to eradicate this unacceptable, illegal practice in Australia.

- The introduction of an Independent Anti-slavery Commissioner.
- A National Compensation Scheme for people trafficked into Australia.

## Attorney-General's Department January-July 2016 Report Summary

ACRATH recently submitted their fourth progress report to the Australian Attorney-General's Department detailing their work over the last 6 months.

### In this reporting period:

- ACRATH volunteers have recorded 3,218 donated hours across Australia.
- 62 presentations/workshops/training days/forums reaching hundreds of community leaders and members, were given/conducted in NSW, VIC, SA, WA, QLD and ACT.
- ACRATH has provided support to 22 people who have been trafficked, and their children.
- ACRATH members attended more than 55 network meetings.
- 30 uploads, 51 new posts and 37 tweets were made to the ACRATH website, Facebook and Twitter pages.
