We had the pleasure of seeing flocks of sheep, the horses out for their morning gallop, as well as soldiers doing their routine exercises as we drove through the Army camp.

Arriving at the Market Square in Kildare town, we divided into 3 groups to swap the experiences and see all that was on offer. While one group was taken on a tour of St. Brigid's Cathedral, grounds and Round Tower the others were entertained to a 3D virtual film of the history of Kildare and the role of Brigid of the 5th century.



Following that initial tour, next we visited at Solas Bhríde and

Hermitages. We were welcomed by Phil, Rita, Geraldine and companions. Our céad míle fáilte included a sit down to hot soup and sandwiches, a delicious welcome and much appreciated.

After lunch, Rita and Phil related the story of Brigid and her legends. The group were so attentive and enthralled by the many stories of the Celtic saint and her monastic foundation in Kildare. Although we

the volunteers had prepared them with some stories, it meant so much more to be present, walking in the footsteps of the saint of 1500 years' ago.

Next day, back at the Intercultural Centre the volunteers listened to interesting conversations about the visit to Kildare. It taught us 'teachers' the value of 'field studies' as an important way of understanding Irish folklore and culture in another step towards integration into the cultural norms and ways of living in Irish life. To give you a flavour of the diversity of our group who travelled to Kildare, their homelands range from Afghanistan, Algeria, Angola, Colombia, Sudan, Tunisia to Ukraine. Such richness of diverse cultures also enhances us, 'Irish' volunteers and our land.
