Farewell Christine

At its final 2024 meeting the National Committee farewelled Christine Carolan at a dinner before she leaves ACRATH in December. Christine's contribution as the National Executive Officer of ACRATH for the past 10 years was acknowledged and President Sr Clare Condon sgs, said Christine's "outstanding social justice commitment" governs all her activities.

Clare acknowledged that in her youth, Christine was greatly influenced by the Cardijn Movement; the Young Christian Students (YCS) and Young Christian Workers (YCW) which sustained her long-standing commitment to the Church's Social Teaching.

"I think of your resilience, persistence and, at times, your tenacity to see the outcomes and the results. For example, the advocacy that has led to the appointment of a Federal Anti-Slavery Commissioner, the alternative pilot program for trafficked people and many other achievements for people who have been trafficked. These qualities of yours emerge from a strong sense of responsibility," Clare said.

"You persist and, at times over many years, until your goals and those of ACRATH are achieved. But you have not done that alone. Collaboration, collegiality, and partnership are inherent in your whole approach. You work alongside committed and generous ACRATH Members and staff and, other civil society organisations to achieve outcomes that we all have in common."

"Underlying your work is the importance of relationships. It is the ground from which you work. You seek to build relationships and to establish long term connections. They are fundamental to your approach. You are an energetic woman who is excited when progress is made."

"As you head off on annual leave, we wish you well and we hope you have the time and space to rest and relax."

Carmel finds the perfect 'fit' with ACRATH

Carmel Shaw's recent appointment as ACRATH's new Community Development Coordinator, is a culmination of decades of working for a fairer world and the dignity of all people. Carmel sees ACRATH as a 'perfect fit'.

While the position with ACRATH might be new to her, Carmel has a long history in working to prevent modern slavery.

It was during her early career as a secondary school teacher that Carmel first learned about Fairtrade and ethical supply chains. She hopes some of the students she taught 20 years ago might still be looking out for products that are certified slavery-free.

In recent years her work with St Vincent's Health Australia gave her the opportunity to learn about human trafficking and ACRATH. She was on the working party that led to the ACRATH and St Vincent's Health Australia (SVHA) Human Trafficking Project, launched in 2017. The project looks at how trafficked people – who may present at any of SVHA's hospitals Australia-wide – can be identified and receive necessary treatment, support, referrals, and access to services. This includes women who have been sexually exploited, people facing forced marriage and people who have experienced forced labour.

"This new job brings together a lot of past experiences such as education, volunteer management and advocacy," said Carmel, who is based in Sydney.

Within weeks of joining ACRATH Carmel headed the recent Canberra advocacy week, training volunteers and coordinating meetings with MPs and policy officers.

"Canberra was a wonderful experience, and it gave me an important insight into how ACRATH is seen. Everyone was so affirming and familiar with ACRATH and values the contribution that ACRATH can make to ending modern slavery in Australia," Carmel said. "It was a great opportunity to meet with people who already respect the organisation and what it has to say."

"One of the big learnings for me was seeing the hard work and commitment of the politicians and their advisors. What we see in the media is often a poor reflection of what happens in Parliament where most of the people believe in building a better and more just society."

Carmel cited the Pacific Australia Labour Mobility (PALM) as one example where MPs and advisors want to hear what ACRATH has to say, particularly in relation to the PALM Scheme Approved Employers Deed and Guidelines published in June 2023.

"We know that there is good compliance, but we also know that some employers are not following the guidelines properly. It's important that seasonal workers leave Australia better off than when they arrived and that requires involvement at many levels of the community," she said.

Next month Carmel will also attend her second Federal Government National Roundtable on Human Trafficking and Slavery, which was established in 2008 as a mechanism for the government to consult with civil society about issues relating to human trafficking. ACRATH has been part of the Roundtable since its early days.

Another key part of her work is the Companionship Program which is undergoing some changes and developing more structures to better support the volunteer Companions.

"We are transitioning the program into a new structure, with more training and support so the Companions can continue to provide person-centred care for victims and survivors of modern slavery. We want to capture and nurture the best of the program, so it is sustainable. That means gaining insights and expertise of the many people who have been involved with the program over many years."



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Attorney-General Mark Dreyfus backs new uni course

A new university program, educating staff and students about modern slavery and pathways for support, has been endorsed by Attorney-General Mark Dreyfus as well as key advocates and educators.

ACRATH, Flinders University and the University of South Australia are working together to create **Educating for Change**, 6 micro-credentialed courses that will equip the next generation of professionals to recognise and combat modern slavery. The courses are free and have been developed for students studying social work, law, criminology, education, and health care as well as for staff working with international students.

Educating for Change has already been trialled in some tertiary settings and is set to be rolled out across the country's universities in 2025.

The Attorney-General encouraged law students to engage in the relevant **Educating for Change** module and said: "Because modern slavery can occur in any sector, industry or domestic setting, I encourage you to learn and understand the indicators of modern slavery so that you can help us identify those who are experiencing modern slavery and support them."

Professor Jennifer Burn AM, Director Anti-Slavery Australia, Faculty of Law, University of Technology Sydney, echoed the Attorney-General's view and said, every lawyer should be aware of what slavery looks like, what the indicators of slavery are. And so, when a person presents to a lawyer or law office, there can be an awareness that not only is this a problem about family violence or property law or housing, or immigration, but there also could be a modern slavery element".

Samantha Lyneham, Principal Research Analyst, Australian Institute of Criminology said: "Research has demonstrated that teachers have a really important role to play in being able to identify and respond to human trafficking that might be happening among, students that they teach. And some of the signs that a child might be experiencing or at risk of, exploitation include that, their attendance at school is quite low, they don't feel comfortable spending time at home, they might be hanging around, a lot of adults instead of children their own age, they might be wearing inappropriate clothing for their age, and they might be talking about things like work or even marriage, that might, you know, send a signal that something's not quite right, especially if they're talking about going overseas, for a marriage as well".

"So teachers, also have a role to play, I think, in educating students about what human trafficking and modern slavery are, and that helps them to learn what it is, know what the signs are, know what to do if they come across something that's suspicious, and can also help them learn about broader consumer behaviours that might help them make ethical choices, as consumers to help prevent human trafficking in society," Ms Lynham said.

ACRATH's Melissa Halliday said the course was almost ready to roll out with final testing of some modules now underway as well as input by an Advisory Committee that includes Australian Red Cross, Anti-Slavery Australia, and the Attorney-General's Department. The Department's funding for the program runs out in June 2025.

ACRATH has also established a working group of people who are developing networks in universities interested in embedding Educating for Change in their courses.

One of ACRATH's key roles is ongoing advocacy that requires staff, planning and resources. The standout example of ACRATH's commitment to long-term advocacy was the announcement at the federal government budget in 2023 of a pathway for victim/survivors of human trafficking onto the Support for Trafficked People Program. ACRATH started working on this in 2005 when a group of counter trafficking NGOs lead by Professor Jennifer Burn made this recommendation as part of a submission to the United Nations. In early October of this year, details of this pilot project were released and ACRATH is working to ensure trafficked people know the service is now available.

Educating for Change, an ACRATH joint project with Flinders Uni and UniSA, is another wonderful project which your donations are helping sustain and strengthen. **Educating for Change** is being rolled out across 21 Australian universities to equip students and staff with the skills to identify human trafficking and ways to respond to reports or concerns. The program is supported by an Advisory Committee that includes St Vincent's Health Australia, Australian Federal Police, and the NSW Anti-Slavery Commissioner.
